

## CLASS of 2016 CORNERSTONE EXPERIENCES



A key component of the Bonner Program is a cornerstone activity requirement for each class, each year. Following is a glimpse of the Class of 2016's cornerstone experiences:

## First-Year Pilgrimage to Tennessee

Our graduating Bonners pioneered the freshman cornerstone experience with their inaugural pilgrimage to Tennessee. Led by the Bonner director and a Bonner senior intern, they traveled for four days through three major cities in Tennessee, meeting with local leaders and learning about community development efforts. This intensive time in close proximity fostered a deep sense of connectedness among the new Bonner cohort and exposed students to profound shared experiences that set the tone for their four-year journey together.

### Second-Year Exchange

Each year, sophomores from Bonner Network schools in Virginia meet for a weekend of workshops, trainings and activities that provide context for the work they do across the Commonwealth. In Spring 2014, CNUs Class of 2016 Bonners planned and hosted the Second-Year Exchange, welcoming second-year Bonners from University of Richmond, Lynchburg College, Washington & Lee, and Emory & Henry to Christopher Newport's campus. Students had the opportunity to appreciate the scope of the Bonner Network

and deepen their understanding of specific issues concerning their regions and state.

## Junior Capstone Experience – Junior Journey to Ecuador

In recognition of the importance of the Bonner Program's International Perspective common commitment, the CNU Bonner Program has established a long-term partnership with Casa Victoria, a local Ecuadorian nonprofit organization run by the daughter of former President Sixto Duran-Ballen, which serves children and families in the capitol city of Quito.

As juniors, our graduating Bonners were the second class to visit Casa Victoria, Quito, and the surrounding communities. They engaged with local and national leaders, including the former

president, to discuss current and future community development efforts. They also met with college students from Universidad de las Americas, visited the residents of Village 235 and completed community-requested projects at Casa Victoria.
