### **Learning Outcomes:**

 Participants will deepen and practice their self-reflection and introspective abilities.

- Participants will talk through their interests.
- Participants will explore how their passions and interests can connect with their service and academic work

#### **Materials:**

- Copies of attached handouts
- Pens/markers

#### **Brief Outline:**

Read and prepare handouts. Think about how you want to guide the use of the time to present the questions and have participants work on them, sharing their responses in a combination of pairs, triads, and the group.

The outline has the following parts (modify to cover number):

1)	Warm up or introduction	suggested time 5 minutes
2)	Introduce first set of questions	suggested time 5 minutes
3)	Time for working and sharing	suggested time 20 minutes
4)	Introduce second set of questions	suggested time 5 minutes
5)	Time for working and sharing	suggested time 20 minutes
6)	Wrap - connect with CLAs	suggested time 5 minutes

There are not detailed instructions for each of these; use your judgement and the attached worksheets.
