

Mobilizing Students for Racial Justice: How Mars Hill Students are Working to Create Change in the Community

The 2020-2021 academic year was full of COVID setbacks, social unrest, national elections, and justice demonstrations. Amid all of this, three Mars Hill University (MHU) students successfully mobilized community members and campus leaders to support Racial Justice initiatives. MHU is a 4-year, private, liberal arts historically white institution (HWI) located in the Blue Ridge Mountain town of Mars Hill which is in Madison County, NC. MHU has the largest percentage of enrolled students of color than any other higher education institution in WNC. Through the formation of a community group, Madison County Racial Justice Coalition, the students and community members developed a plan to increase community awareness of Racial Justice issues and to promote an environment that is welcoming and affirming to all people of color. The plan included penning the first Mars Hill Town Resolution acknowledging Black History Month. By signing the Resolution, the Town Aldermen recognized the town's history and how African American's played a vital role in building the town and Mars Hill University. Town Leadership pledged to engage in conversations about race in order to promote racial equity.

The First-Year Community Engaged Learning Requirement Re-imagined: A Model for Responsible Community Engagement

At TCNJ, First-Year Community Engaged Learning (FYCEL) is a graduation requirement that includes service, education and reflection requiring an eight hour experience that addresses the unmet needs of the local or regional community. Originally, the design of this model was student-led and was completed through a one-day experience. Over time, the efficacy of this model was questioned and with the support of on and off-campus partners, a new model was developed that provided a better orientation for responsible community engagement. The requirement was reimagined into a two-week orientation which includes three in-class sessions, a half day of service and a "1-Pager" used to facilitate reflection. We will introduce the model and reflection method, and review its development. Examples of completed 1-Pagers will be shared in the workshop and participants will be provided with a model of 1-Pager to complete throughout the workshop to practice this method. We will share data on the success of this model compared to the previous model. The workshop will end with breakout sessions where participants can ask questions or brainstorm how they could utilize these methods.


